


Author Dr. Jenn Chen is ACBC certified and has taught biblical counseling at seminaries and universities. With a Psy.D in Clinical Psychology and an MA

Being herself well-versed in the discipline, Dr. Chen analyzes the ICD, DSM, and the topic of mental illness in light of what those in the field are themselves saying and in light of the greater light of Scripture. Chen demonstrates that psychology has medicalized human experience, which has made people believe there are biological problems when there are none, led people to fabricate disorders based upon subjective criteria, and given ineffective and even harmful solutions to these issues. Such dangers ultimately arise because, in accepting the notion of mental illness, one shifts one's presuppositions away from the truth of Scripture to a completely antithetical worldview. This work is a reminder that even though believers must remain humble, they should not be intimidated away from the sufficiency of God's Word by technical labels.
